Conditions for Eligibility

To be considered eligible for inclusion into the Developer Assistance Program, you and your project must meet the following conditions:

1. Your project must be open source, i.e. any source code that exists must be visible online, and your project must be licensed under an open source project license.
2. Your project must fit in with the CitizenWeb Project's goals. It must be concerned with decentralization of the Internet: this can be in promoting self-hosting of services, personal security and cryptography, decentralized social networking or apps, mesh/peer-to-peer networking and technologies, cryptocurrencies, or other related fields. If you are unsure if your project or idea applies, discuss it with us.

Developer Assistance Program Agreement

If you are accepted into the Developer Assistance Program as part of the CitizenWeb Project, you agree to uphold and respect the following rules and conditions for participation in the program.

1. **Your project must remain open source.** With respect to the Program, that means that: a) your project must post its source code online at least once every major release, and b) your software must be licensed under an “open source” project license, such as but not limited to BSD, MIT, GPL, etc. We highly recommend that you use a public repository to display your code, like GitHub or Subversion. If you need help with this, we can help.
2. **Your project must remain actively developed.** The term “active” may vary but is very flexible. The goal here is to make sure that you are actively using the services, and not to force you into writing code if you have no time to do it. Off-weeks and breaks are, of course, admissible within reason. We just want to make sure you retain interest in developing your project, and that users can benefit as much as possible from it. If your project falls out of active development as determined by us, and you can't be reached, we retain the right to remove you from the Program and its services, and provide you with a backed-up copy of any of your data that we can find.
3. **You must adhere to a basic standard of conduct when using our services.** Contravening the Don't Be Stupid™ policy is strictly forbidden. This includes using Project services or networks for distributing malware or spam, attacking or intruding into other project's spaces, conducting DDoS attacks, getting us kicked off of our hosting provider, and so on. If you are suspected of breaking these rules, we will contact you to determine the circumstances. We reserve the right to remove you from the Program at any time in connection with this provision.
4. **Be awesome.** Stay in touch with us, let us know if you have problems or comments about the services, write great code and have fun!
